
Indicates where the minibus is most likely to be parked.







We shall be working in the woodland garden where we did some hedgelaying in the winter, we will be doing various things including possibly pathwork















We will be building some steps and a handrail.




This park commands stunning views across Reading and the Oxfordshire countryside. We will be bramble clearing.

Attention Grabber BOOTS

Last December we carried out some pine removal from a heathland near Camberley. These pine trees were then taken to Caversham Court and sold as environmentally friendly Christmas trees. TOAD TRANSPLANT

On the hottest day of the year so far (it was only march) a small select group of CROW volunteers gathered around the picnic table to hear the afternoon plans revealed in full. All that hot sweaty morning hedge planting the rumour had been of a cool shady job in the afternoon...what was it to be?

A wildlife rescue was on the cards. We were told a tragic tale of an over silted lake in need of draining. Leaving some of the indigenous population high and dry at a critical stage of their damp and squidgy lives. Spawn Rescue was needed and CROW were the unlikely band chosen for the job.

Waders were issued, buckets found and a huge bucket designated as transport module for the spawns short van ride to safety, the team set off for Heathlake. Dropping water levels were already revealing great rafts of frog spawn and tree branches dripping with toad spawn strings, suddenly that huge bucket didn't look so spacious. Thirty minutes, slimly hands and one leaky pair of waders later the first consignment of embryonic toads and frogs were dispatched to temporary store at the California Park paddling pool. It was at about this point a flaw in the plan became apparent, the huge bucket had no lid and was very full. Disaster threatened, had the spawn been plucked from a drying lake only to be smeared around the inside of a lurching van ... to be continued.

Meanwhile back at the lake, more amphibious nurseries had been discovered, full of the stickiest frog spawn known to CROW. This stuff was just like tapioca and about as easy to scoop up, once again buckets were filled to over flowing. Andy moaned about his leaking waders and Sarah wondered why she had ended up with the worlds first chin high waders. Members of the public regarded us with curiosity and learned the difference between Frog spawn (tapioca) and Toad (slimly strings with black dots).

Did the stricken spawn survive? Yes thanks to an ingenious new use for the humble black bin bag. It can be revealed that bin bags make excellent temporary transport modules for junior amphibians. Thanks to this discovery more spawn than anticipated were scooped from the lake and sent on their way to the paddling pool. Work on the lake's silt problem will hopefully be complete before the spawn hatch and in a few weeks the process will be reversed to return Heathlakes next generation to their natural home. This bunch of boarding school tadpoles will grow up never knowing what a close call they had with sunshine and the back of a van.
