

DECEMBER 96




JANUARY 1997




The Cowsey is a fairly large open area which is home to two old ponds (under restoration) we shall be clearing invasive scrub and may even have a bonfire!




FEBRUARY



We will be restoring a small wildlife area in the church grounds which has become over grown and been invaded by trees which are shading out the ground flora. NB we may not use the minibus on this task due to problems parking along the Oxford Road. It would help if you could make your own way to the site, it's five minutes walk from the town centre.



We shall be pollarding (cutting the shoots and branches that grow from the trunk at a height of about 12 ft) the willow trees that surround the pond. This will be our third year doing this and it's always an entertaining task.








As part of Woodland Action Week we shall be clearing scrub and planting trees to extend the Earley Community Forest Note that Elderberry close has only recently been built, and is not shown on many maps (including this one).




We will be planting a new hedge along the edge of the woodland.






We will be felling diseased elm and invasive sycamore trees in order to open up a small heathland area.




We will be carrying out woodland management and possibly footpath work.






Using logs from the trees felled on our last task here, we will be building steps which will direct visitors along paths through more sensitive areas of the park

FIRESTARTER

(a.k.a "CROW's Bonfire Night")

8.30 am Wednesday November 6. I jump out of bed with much excitement, for today is the day that CROW celebrates Bonfire night! I dress quickly and grab my contribution to tonight's meal: home made coleslaw, before rushing out of the door.

9.30am I meet up with Andy and the other volunteers at the Station (I'm dressed so warmly that I feel like the Michelin man!). We are soon on our way to the site.

Waiting to meet us is Paul Bruce, the Berkshire Heathlands Officer. Paul explains that we'll be cutting down Birch trees which are encroaching onto the heathland and choking the heather. Andy then makes sure that the team is instructed in the use of tools.

10.10am With cries of "Save the Heath", the team are soon attacking Birch trees.

11am The felled Birch trees have piled up, and the team decides that a fire is needed. At this point, Andy produces the CROW FIRESTARTER! (see diagram). Immediate thoughts are duh?? but my look of utter surprise is met with a "I can't believe you've never used a fire lighting kit before."

FIRE STARTS HERE

"Er.. no."

It turns out that the basic principle of the Firestarter is to spin a pole of wood very quickly on top of a plank of wood until sparks fly at the contact point. Any Questions?

I give it a go - nothing happens. Other members of the team also try in vain. Finally Andy admits that he's never used the firelighting kit either, and it was all a bit of an experiment. Then, as it by magic, a box of matches appear. The firestarter is relegated to the back of the minibus, and the team soon have a hearty fire burning.

"I'm a Firestarter"... not! I return to felling Birch.

12am Lunchtime. The kettle is put on and much food is consumed.

1pm More volunteers arrive, so we move onto bigger Birch trees. Cries of "Timber" echo across the Common. Paul Bruce can also be seen sporting the latest in white plastic jump suits

(?). It turns out that he's treating the tree stumps (with an ecologically sound substance) in order to prevent the Birch from regenerating. I wonder if this look will hit the catwalk soon?

4.30pm Many trees and a tea break later, it's starting to get dark, so we decide to wind down and prepare for the Bonfire night celebrations. Tools are packed away and potatoes are put onto the fire.

5.30 aprox. More volunteers arrive. Potatoes are consumed together with yummy vegetable Biriyani (made by Ron) and green tomato chutney (Christine). This is followed by the CROW apple pie (Natalie and Bethany). Who'd have thought that a conservation group would have so many chefs in the making?

6.30 aprox. Let the CROW firework display commence! Andy is seen disappearing into the darkness, and seconds later the sky is filled with dazzling colour! There are many Ahhs! and Ooos! form the group assembled.

7.30pm The celebrations come to a close and the team are off home. What a tremendous day!

The moral of the story is.....if you want to conserve your local environment and have fun at the same time, then CROW is the group for you!






